

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ADVENT CAROLS

Advent, observed in the four weeks before Christmas Day, is a distinct liturgical season, with a more contemplative, austere character in contrast to the festivity of Christmas. Themes of repentance and renewal are set against the arc of biblical time: from the creation story to the end of days described in the Book of Revelation. The word Advent, from the Latin adventus, means "coming", "approach" or "arrival". For the Church, this time of spiritual alertness anticipates both the annual celebration of the Nativity, and Christ's second coming. The mood is one of both sorrow for our flawed human condition, and anticipated joy at mankind's redemption.

In modern secular times, this distinction has been lost in the long commercial leadup to Christmas, whose music and imagery are well-worn throughout the preceding weeks. Yet Advent both prefigures and forestalls the unfolding of the Christmas story. It links the ancient prophecies of the Old Testament with Christ's birth, ministry, death and resurrection, and invites reflection on several themes: the last judgement; the coming of the Kingdom; the way prepared by John the Baptist, Christ's forerunner; and Mary's acceptance of her calling as the mother of Jesus.

Composers down the ages have responded to this rich spiritual and scriptural landscape, with choral settings that articulate Advent's singular blend of solemnity, expectation and hope. Tonight's programme includes texts from the Advent liturgy itself; from some of the most well-known verses of the Old and New Testaments; and poetry and prose inspired by the key motifs of Advent. The varied musical styles range from the stillness and simplicity of plainchant, to the dancelike melodies of the middle ages and Renaissance, and the grandeur of an Edwardian canticle setting.

MARK FORKGEN CONDUCTOR



Mark Forkgen has been the Music Director of London Concert Choir since 1996. He is also Music Director of Canticum chamber choir, Principal Conductor and Artistic Advisor of Kokoro (the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra's New Music Group) and Director of Music at Tonbridge School.

He has conducted major UK orchestras, including the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment, Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, City of London Sinfonia, English Chamber Orchestra, Northern Philharmonia and Manchester Camerata, and appeared at major venues, including the Royal Festival Hall, the Royal Albert Hall and the Barbican. Outside the UK he has conducted in Denmark, Spain, France, Belgium, Germany, Holland, Eire, the Czech Republic, Italy, Bulgaria and Hong Kong.

A specialist in the field of choral and contemporary music, Mark also enjoys an active life as a pianist, focusing on twentieth-century and contemporary music, and has been Conductor and Artistic Advisor for a number of highly acclaimed festivals.

Highlights this Autumn include a programme of Marian music, Brahms' Symphony No 4, a production of Guys and Dolls and masterclasses in Beijing, Shanghai, Shenzhen and Hong Kong.

LAURENCE WILLIAMS ORGAN/PIANO



Laurence Williams is an accompanist, organist, bass-baritone soloist and choral conductor. He has played for London Concert Choir since 2018. He was organ scholar at St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle, and now balances a career encompassing conducting, playing and singing.

As a bass-baritone soloist, he specialises in oratorio, and is acclaimed for his eloquent singing and rich tone. He has sung with many renowned UK choirs including Polyphony and the Monteverdi Choir.

As a director, he runs the music at the church of St Michael and All Angels, Barnes, a choral society and two children's choirs. He is also Assistant Conductor of London Concert Choir. He delights in working with non-professional musicians and bringing his singing expertise to help people achieve their best.

Laurence is also the founder of Dowland Youth Works, a scheme that introduces teenagers to Lute song and consort singing.

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One of London's leading amateur choirs, London Concert Choir celebrated its 60th anniversary in 2020. The choir is notable for the commitment and musicality of its performances in an unusually varied repertoire and regularly appears with Mark Forkgen at London's premier concert venues, while tours abroad have included visits to France, Germany, Italy, Poland and Spain.

The choir's 50th anniversary was marked by two performances of Britten's *War Requiem*. Other major works have included Rachmaninov's choral symphony *The Bells* with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, and Elgar's *Dream of Gerontius*, Mendelssohn's *Elijah*, Brahms' *German Requiem* and Vaughan Williams' *Sea Symphony*, all with Southbank Sinfonia. The choir has also taken part in the St John's Smith Square Christmas Festival, together with Southbank Sinfonia.

Operas in concert performance have ranged from Purcell's King Arthur and Dido and Aeneas to Gershwin's Porgy and Bess. Performances with Counterpoint period instrumental ensemble include Handel's Messiah, Bach's St Matthew and St John Passions and Christmas Oratorio, Monteverdi's Vespers of 1610 and Mozart's 'Great' C minor Mass. LCC has also performed Rachmaninov's Vespers and Will Todd's Mass in Blue and a selection of highlights from the musicals of Rodgers and Hammerstein.

London Concert Choir often gives concerts for charity, including Christmas Carol concerts in aid of St George's Hospital Children's wards. Among the choir's new music commissions have been A Light not yet Ready to Go Out by Alison Willis, in aid of Breast Cancer Now, and Per Ardua ad Astra, a major work by Roderick Williams to commemorate the centenary of the RAF.
