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MARK FORKGEN

CONDUCTOR



Mark Forkgen has been the Music Director of London Concert Choir since 1996. He is also Music Director of Canticum chamber choir, Principal Conductor and Artistic Advisor of Kokoro (the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra's New Music Group) and Director of Music at Tonbridge School.

He has conducted major UK orchestras, including the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment, Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, City of London Sinfonia, English Chamber Orchestra, English Northern Philharmonia and Manchester Camerata, and appeared at major venues, including the Royal Festival Hall, the Royal Albert Hall and the Barbican. Outside the UK he has conducted in Denmark, Spain, France, Belgium, Germany, Holland, Eire, the Czech Republic, Italy, Bulgaria and Hong Kong.

A specialist in the field of choral and contemporary music, Mark also enjoys an active life as a pianist, focusing on twentieth-century and contemporary music, and has been Conductor and Artistic Advisor for a number of highly acclaimed festivals.

Here Mark Forkgen answers questions from the choir:

WHAT GOT YOU INTO MUSIC?

My early years were dominated by singing. I was a chorister at our local church, St Andrew's, Enfield, before joining the choir of the Temple Church in London under Sir George Thalben-Ball and John Birch. I also sang in some operas at the Royal Opera House. Experiencing this level of music-making at such a young age meant I engaged with music and performing rather than doing exams. I had started the piano at this stage, but instrumentally I was a slow burner!

WHERE DID YOU STUDY MUSIC?

I attended the City of London School for Boys and was Organ Scholar at the Temple Church before going to Cambridge as the Organ Scholar of Queens'

College, reading Music. I then won a scholarship to study conducting at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama where I studied with Christopher Seaman. I was also very lucky to spend time with Michael Tilson Thomas and Mstislav Rostropovich.

OUTSIDE 'CLASSICAL' MUSIC, WHAT OTHER GENRES, COMPOSERS, WRITERS, MUSICIANS, BANDS DO YOU LIKE AND LISTEN TO?

My knowledge of 'pop' music starts to fizzle out post 1980s. I grew up in North London, went to a lot of gigs at Wembley Arena and other venues, seeing Stevie Wonder, Billy Joel, The Police and Queen. Nowadays, I mainly listen in the car. My two favourite 'pop' songwriters are Paul Simon and Billy Joel.

DO YOU LIKE JAZZ?

Absolutely! Many of you would have seen my love of Jazz when we've performed the Ellington *Sacred Concert*, Will Todd's *Mass in Blue* and the Gershwin night. I played in a Jazz Quartet at university and must admit that I pull rank and run the Tonbridge School Big Band!

DO YOU PREFER CONDUCTING OR PERFORMING?

Interesting distinction as I still feel I'm 'performing' when conducting. It's just that you're performing more for the people in front of you rather than those behind you. Obviously, some conductors think of it the other way round! I wouldn't want to just conduct or play. The big adjustment in conducting is that you're not making the sound physically and obviously need musicians around you. This was one of the great attractions as a contrast to the solitary life of a keyboard player.

HAVE YOU EVER SPENT TIME IN A MUSIC THEATRE 'PIT BAND'?

Yes. I've been the MD for several musical theatre productions. For some of these I've been conducting but often I'm leading from the keyboard. These have been short runs rather than the week in-week out West End model. The mix has been eclectic: West Side Story, The Threepenny Opera, Into the Woods, The Boyfriend, Oh! What a Lovely War, Chess, Cabaret and my favourite, Sweeney Todd. Hopefully we'll get to do it with LCC at some point.

DO YOU HAVE A FAVOURITE CONCERT, VENUE AND CONDUCTOR?

Favourite venue is the KKL [Culture and Congress Centre] in Lucerne.

Favourite concert and conductor can easily be rolled into one. We queued for hours and hours in the snow outside the Philharmonie in Berlin and finally manged to get returns at 7.28pm! It was Bruckner's Symphony No. 7 with Claudio Abbado conducting. The slow movement was simply overwhelming. I realised that our whole row had been reduced to tears. I would have queued for days.

LAURENCE WILLIAMS

ORGAN/PIANO



Laurence Williams is an accompanist, organist, bass-baritone soloist and choral conductor. He has played for London Concert Choir since 2018. He was organ scholar at St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle, and now balances a career encompassing conducting, playing and singing.

As a bass-baritone soloist, he specialises in oratorio, and is acclaimed for his eloquent singing and rich tone. He has sung with many renowned UK choirs including Polyphony and the Monteverdi Choir.

As a director, he runs the music at the church of St Michael and All Angels, Barnes, a choral society and two children's choirs. He is also Assistant Conductor of London Concert Choir. He delights in working with non-professional musicians and bringing his singing expertise to help people achieve their best.

Laurence is also the founder of Dowland Youth Works, a scheme that introduces teenagers to Lute song and consort singing.

Since its formation in 1960, London Concert Choir has grown to more than 100 members of a wide range of ages and is now one of London's leading amateur choirs. Notable for its commitment and musicality in an unusually varied repertoire, the choir regularly appears with Music Director Mark Forkgen at London's premier concert venues and in cathedrals and churches in and around the capital, while tours abroad have included visits to France, Germany, Italy, Poland and Spain.

The choir celebrated its 50th anniversary with memorable performances of Britten's War Requiem in the Barbican and Salisbury Cathedral. Among other major choral/orchestral works have been Rachmaninov's choral symphony The Bells with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, and Elgar's Dream of Gerontius, Mendelssohn's Elijah, Brahms' German Requiem and Vaughan Williams' Sea Symphony, all with Southbank Sinfonia.

Operas in concert performance have ranged from Purcell's King Arthur to Gershwin's Porgy and Bess. Concerts with Counterpoint period instrumental ensemble include Handel's Messiah, Bach's St Matthew and St John Passions and Christmas Oratorio, Monteverdi's Vespers of 1610 and Mozart's 'Great' C minor Mass.

This year LCC has sung two concerts of sacred music: Rachmaninov's unaccompanied *Vespers* and music by French organist-composers Langlais and Duruflé. In contrast, the choir has previously performed Duke Ellington's *Sacred Concert* and Will Todd's *Mass in Blue*, and this summer joined forces with current and past members of Southbank Sinfonia for a popular concert of highlights from the musicals of Rodgers and Hammerstein. For the second year running, London Concert Choir and Southbank Sinfonia recently gave the opening concert of the annual Christmas Festival at St John's Smith Square.

The choir's performances for charity have included a new work by Alison Willis, A Light not yet Ready to Go Out, in aid of Breast Cancer Now. The choir also commissioned Per Ardua ad Astra, a major work by the choir's President, Roderick Williams, written to mark the centenary of the RAF in 2018.
